Chinese envoy's concern over Tibetan studies seminar in Kathmandu

Organisers say event purely an academic gathering as Beijing fears influence by Dalai Lama supporters.

Chinese Ambassador to Nepal Zhang Maoming has expressed concerns over the upcoming 17th Seminar of the International Association for Tibetan Studies to be organised from August 23-29 in Kathmandu. Ambassador Zhang met Foreign Secretary Amrit Bahadur Rai on Tuesday and discussed the upcoming event, said one senior foreign ministry official. The Chinese envoy drew the attention of the foreign secretary and cautioned that the event could be used by supporters of the exiled Tibetan spiritual leader Dalai Lama, according to the official.

Researchers and experts on Tibetan studies from around the globe will gather next month.

The envoy said some individuals could speak against China and in support of Tibet, and urged officials to make sure that no such things happen, the official told the Post. Hundreds of researchers, scholars and experts on Tibetan studies from around the globe will gather at the event. According to the website of the International Association of Tibetan Studies, the seminar will be organised jointly by the Himalaya Centre for Asian Studies, Kathmandu University (HiCAS, KU); and the Kathmandu University Centre for Buddhist Studies at Rangjung Yeshe Institute (KU-CBS at RYI). The conveners are Prof Sagar Sharma (HiCAS) and Prof Thomas Doctor (KU-CBS at RYI). Some Kathmandu-based individuals sympathetic to Beijing's position on Tibet have also expressed concern over the event saying that promoting Tibetan language, culture and history could ultimately be interpreted as support for the Dalai Lama's views.

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Congress rift widens with Deuba faction veering towards split

Dissident leaders announce an August 14 national gathering and warn of forming a new party if efforts to restore unity in the country's oldest political force fail.

Six months after a special general convention triggered an internal power struggle in the Nepali Congress, the party's deepening rift remains unresolved, with leaders loyal to former president Sher Bahadur Deuba moving ahead with their plan to form a separate party. On Wednesday the two rival factions marked the 44th BP Memorial Day by holding separate programmes. Addressing a gathering organised by the dissenting faction, leaders warned that they would form a new party if efforts to reconcile with the Congress establishment led by Gagan Thapa failed. The faction also announced a national gathering in Kathmandu on August 14 to chart its future political course. Purna Bahadur Khadka, who leads the Deuba camp, said that discussions on accommodation of the dissenters were not aimed at securing positions for themselves but were intended to achieve a "dignified unity" with

the party headquarters. "We are not going to remain inactive. We are ready to move forward by bringing young leaders to the forefront and standing as their shield," Khadka said, hinting at the possibility of forming another party. "We do not want anything for ourselves. We fought even during the Panchayat era for dignity. We would rather die than compromise on our dignity."

Analysts call on both sides to reconcile, ask party establishment to accommodate dissidents.

Meanwhile, the establishment faction led by party president Thapa observed the memorial for the late party founder BP Koirala with a two-day event. After organising a "Green Run" on Wednesday to raise awareness about climate change, it held a discussion on Thursday on Koirala's

political philosophy, democratic socialism and contemporary challenges facing the country. But the commemorations also laid bare the party's deepening divisions. Senior leader Shekhar Koirala attended Wednesday's programme organised by the Deuba faction, a move that drew attention as he had previously stayed away from events hosted by the dissident camp. Others attending the function included senior leaders Prakash Man Singh, Krishna Prasad Sitaula, Bimalendra Nidhi, Shashank Koirala, Bijaya Kumar Gachhadar and Prakash Sharan Mahat. Badri Pandey, a leader close to Shekhar, said the senior leader had informed his supporters that he would attend the function. "We knew in advance that Shekhar dai would attend. Once he made up his mind, we did not try to stop him, but we decided not to go," Pandey said. At the event, Koirala took aim at Thapa's leadership, accusing the party of drifting towards authoritarianism.

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Nepal's 'free' schooling comes with a long list of fees

Students from grades 9 to 12 pay thousands of rupees in government-imposed charges every year, even as the constitution and the Act Relating to Compulsory and Free Education guarantee free education up to the secondary level.

Despite the constitutional guarantee of free education up to the secondary level, the government continues to charge students thousands of rupees in mandatory fees under various headings, generating more than Rs2.5 billion in annual revenue from students alone. Article 31 of the constitution guarantees every citizen the right to free and compulsory education up to the basic level (grade 8) and free education up to the secondary level (grade 12). To enforce this provision, Parliament enacted the Act Relating to Compulsory and Free Education in 2018, followed by the Compulsory and Free Education Regulations in 2020. Yet students and their parents must bear more than a dozen government-imposed charges throughout secondary school. The continued collection of these fees has raised questions over whether the state has fulfilled its promise of free education up to grade 12. A student pays more than Rs5,000 to the government in various mandatory charges between grades 9 and 12. Every year, between 400,000 and 600,000 students enrol in those grades. Based on enrolment figures, the government collects more than Rs2.5 billion annually through registration, examination and academic certificate fees alone. It also continues to levy numerous additional charges that critics say are incompatible with the constitutional

guarantee of free education. According to the National Examinations Board, every student enrolled in both community and private schools must pay a registration fee of Rs300 upon joining grade 9. When they reach grade 10, schools collect an examination application fee of Rs500 from each student and deposit it with the government. Narayan Pokhrel, information officer at the Board, said students must also pay

Rs400 for subject registration in grade 11. Around 400,000 students enrol in grade 11 every year. After paying fees in grades 9, 10 and 11, students are required to pay another Rs800 examination application fee in grade 12. Even after passing the examinations, they must pay additional charges to obtain their academic certificates for both grade 10 and grade 12. While the Ministry of Education

PM Shah's outreach amuses stakeholders, puzzles observers

Business leaders say meetings have renewed confidence, but analysts argue implementation ultimately depends on ministries that were largely missing from discussions.

After 100 days in office Prime Minister Balendra Shah has held marathon consultations with business leaders, professionals and other stakeholders in an apparent bid to restore confidence in an administration struggling to convince the private sector that it can deliver economic reforms. The meetings have been widely welcomed by attendants, who say the prime minister has spent hours listening to their concerns and promising solutions. Yet they have also prompted questions over why responsible ministers have been absent from most of the interactions. Finance Minister Swarnim Wagle did not attend meetings with representatives of the private sector, capital market or insurance industry. Minister for Industry, Commerce and Supplies Gauri Kumari Yadav was also absent from discussions with industrialists and manufacturers. Energy, Water Resources and Irrigation Minister Biraj Bhakta Shrestha did not participate in talks with independent power producers, while Infrastructure Development Minister Sunil Lamslam was absent from discussions with construction contractors. Only a handful of meetings included the relevant ministers. Education Minister Sasmit Pokharel accompanied Shah during discussions with newly appointed vice-chancellors of various universities on July 14, while Culture, Tourism and Civil Aviation Minister Khadak Raj Paudel attended a meeting with Hotel Association Nepal representatives a day later. The present government was formed on March 27 under the leadership of the Rastriya Swatantra Party senior leader Shah. The Shah government completed its 100 days on July 4. Although the administration has claimed it laid the foundation for good governance and initiated several major reforms during the period, economic indicators have remained weak and business confidence has continued to decline. Against that backdrop, the prime minister himself has taken the lead in reaching out to different sectors. Participants in several meetings, however, said they were surprised not to find the ministers directly responsible for implementing many of the

commitments being discussed. Prime Minister Shah has held more than 10 formal consultations with different groups. Despite the breadth of the agenda, ministers from related portfolios have featured quite rarely. The absence has fuelled debate because any commitments made during the meetings ultimately require implementation through line ministries. Officials and governance experts

say excluding ministers from such discussions risks creating uncertainty over responsibility and decision-making. Former chief secretary Bimal Koirala downplayed concerns, arguing that the prime minister, as the head of government, has every authority to hear grievances directly and steer solutions. "It does not carry a significant meaning if ministers are absent from these meetings," said Koirala. "Whether the knife falls on the apple or the apple falls on the knife, it is the apple that gets cut. The important thing is solving the problem. If the prime minister himself listens to concerns and seeks solutions, that is even better. After all, the ministers are members of his Cabinet." Former minister Kulman Ghising, however, believes the discussions would have been more effective had ministers participated alongside the prime minister.

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ties," the principal of a community school in Kathmandu told Kantipur. Long queues of students can be seen every day at the Board's central and provincial offices to obtain academic certificates or correct errors in them. In many cases, schools collect the fees directly from students before forwarding them to the Board. Sneha Rupakheti, who passed grade 12 this year, said she paid Rs1,500 to receive her transcript, migration certificate and provisional certificate. She said she had already paid another Rs2,000 in registration, examination application and subject registration fees between grades 9 and 12. She also spent Rs1,500 to obtain her grade 10 certificate. Parents have complained that some schools charge students more than the government-prescribed fees and retain part of the additional amount for their own expenses. Students and parents also allege that private schools routinely collect more than the fees fixed by the board. According to information provided by the board, students in grades 11 and 12 are subject to fees under 20 different categories. Students must pay Rs500 for a supplementary certificate and Rs500 each for duplicate copies of academic certificates. A permanent certificate costs an additional Rs1,000. The board charges Rs500 to authenticate an original certificate and another Rs500 to verify copies of mark sheets, grade sheets and certificates.

US civil rights agency moves to end demographic data collection after 60 years

How many women hold executive-level positions at top US companies? What is the racial and ethnic breakdown of those roles? What is the gender and racial breakdown of the lowest-paid roles at those companies?

The Trump administration is making it harder for the public to know, moving to toss aside a 60-year-old requirement for tens of thousands of private sector employers to submit workforce demographic reports each year to the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, the agency responsible for enforcing anti-discrimination laws in the workplace.

The EEOC's Republican majority voted 2-1 on Tuesday to rescind the data collection requirement, submitting the proposal to a 30-day public commentary period before final approval. The proposal is a quiet but profound salvo in President Donald Trump's shake up of civil rights enforcement, ending a practice that has endured through 10 Republican and Democratic administrations.

EEOC Chair Andrea Lucas, an outspoken critic of diversity and inclusion practices who has urged white men to come forward with discrimination complaints, argued that requiring companies to submit the annual demographic reports risks encouraging companies to justify discriminatory practices to diversify their workforce.

"It may promote racial stereotyping at work, and it may encourage employers to engage in discrimination," Lucas said during a hearing ahead of the vote.

Former Democratic EEOC commissioners and civil rights organizations have denounced the proposal, saying it will deprive the agency of a critical tool for uncovering discrimination patterns and tracking how women and racial minorities have fared since the 1964 Civil Rights Act, which created the EEOC and prohibited employment discrimination based on race, color, sex, national origin and religion.

The EEOC, which receives more than 88,000 worker complaints each year, has historically used the data to guide its enforcement priorities and inform some of its investigations.

Commissioner Kalpana Kotagal, the sole Democrat left on the EEOC since Trump moved to wrest control of the agency, voted against the proposal.

"Today, the commission discusses whether to turn back time to a period before the civil rights movement, kneecapping its ability to protect workers," Kotagal said.

Here's what to know about the reporting requirement and the proposal to end it:

How the EEOC has collected the data

Since 1966, the EEOC has required companies with at least 100 employees, or federal contractors with at least 50 workers, to submit a form called the EEO-1 each year.

The form, which has evolved over time, identifies 10 job categories from "Executive/Senior Level Officials and Managers" to "Labourers" and "Service Workers." It asks employers to report on the number male and female workers in each job category, as well as the number of workers from different race and ethnicities.

The data typically covers more than 50 million employees and 73,000 employers nationwide.

A view into gender and race in the private sector

The EEOC launched during the Biden administration an interactive tool allowing the public to explore historical demographic metrics across industries and job categories. The most recent data is from 2023. Under the Trump administration, the EEOC last collected EEO-1 data for the year 2024 but has not publicly disclosed it. Collection of the year 2025 would have begun this year.

The data shows white men dominating executive and senior manager roles at private companies, though women and minorities have made inroads, especially in the years following the #MeToo and Black Lives Matters movements.

Women remain underrepresented in the top ranks of companies. While they make up nearly half the workforce at the companies surveyed, women held just 34.5 percent of executives and senior manager roles in 2023. That was up from 29.2 percent a decade earlier. White and Asian women made the fastest gains, and by 2023, were no longer underrepresented in senior roles compared to their numbers in the overall workforce. In contrast, Black and Hispanic women remained sharply underrepresented in executive and senior manager roles despite making modest gains.

Asian men have been proportionally represented in senior roles for years, while Black and Hispanic men remained underrepresented in 2023.

Of those demographic groups, only one was overrepresented in senior roles: white men, who made up a third of the overall workforce at the companies surveyed but held 52.7 percent of executive and senior management roles. Lucas said the annual reporting requirements impose "hundreds of millions of dollars" on costs on employers, a burden she argued was unnecessary absent "any allegation, indication, or evidence of discrimination."

The move was recommended by Project 2025, the conservative Heritage Foundation's blueprint that has guided many of the Trump administration's policies.

A group of former Democratic EEOC commissioners and legal counselors said there is little evidence that companies are routinely using employment data to engage in quotas or race-based hiring.

Iran's demands over Strait of Hormuz would set a dangerous precedent, Rubio warns

US Secretary of State Marco Rubio warned Asian leaders Wednesday that Iran's demand to control and collect tolls in the Strait of Hormuz would threaten the world's economy and set a precedent that could be repeated elsewhere in the world.

Rubio spoke at the start of an annual meeting in the Philippine capital, Manila, with counterparts from the Association of Southeast Asian Nations who have expressed alarm over the resurgent war in the Middle East that has battered their region. Despite Washington's preoccupation with the war, Rubio said "we're with ASEAN 100 percent."

"If we create a precedent in the Middle East where a nation state can decide that they are going to control an international waterway, charge a toll and if you don't pay them, blow up your ships, we have created a very dangerous precedent which will repeat itself in other parts of the world, including in this region," he said.

Washington's top diplomat also renewed allegations that Iran has reneged on commitments under a failed peace deal. Rubio said Iran "has been reaching out to the United States, both directly and indirectly, to engage in talks about settling the differences," but gave no indication that the U.S. was considering returning to peace talks with Iran.

Top diplomats from the US, China, Russia and several other countries are in Manila this week to take part in at the ASEAN ministerial gathering. Newly minted British Foreign Secretary Ed Miliband was arriving Wednesday, his office said.

Sergey Lavrov, Russia's foreign minister, told reporters that Moscow would like to see a quick settlement between the US and Iran.

"There are those eager to incite each party to keep the conflict going, but we aren't one of those," he said.

"We would like to see it stop—it impacts the global economy and Russia is part of the global economy," Lavrov said, adding that Moscow is "interested in stable global energy prices to pursue long-term economic policies."

Southeast Asia hit hard by energy shock from Iran war

Australian Foreign Minister Penny Wong underscored her country's concern over the renewed war in the Middle East, warning that "the situation could deteriorate further without much warning."

"We want to see an end to this war. We want to see a ceasefire. We want to see negotiations and we want the strait to be opened," Wong told reporters.

"People are being affected by what is happening and has happened to global energy markets and the effect on people has been direct and personal," she said.

Overreliance on fossil fuel imports from the Middle East has made Southeast Asia particularly vulnerable to the energy shock triggered by the Iran war, according to the International Energy Agency, which called the crisis a "stark wake-up call" for the region's energy security.

Asian markets imported about 80 percent of the crude oil and almost 90 percent of the liquefied natural gas, or LNG, transiting through the Strait of Hormuz in 2025, the IEA said.

Rubio and allies reaffirm commitment to counter growing Chinese influence

Rubio also met with counterparts in the four-nation Quad partnership, which is made up of the US, Australia, India and Japan. They discussed maritime and transnational security, among other issues, and issued a joint statement after the talks that reaffirmed their commitment to maritime security initiatives aiming to counter China's growing influence in the region. During the meeting, Japanese Foreign Minister Toshimitsu Motegi voiced strong opposition to any attempts to change the status quo by force in the region, including in the disputed South China Sea and East China Sea, where China's increasingly aggressive actions have sparked concern.

Tokyo has a long-running dispute over Japan-controlled islands, which Beijing also claims, in the East China Sea. Wong echoed his concern, saying "we have real concerns about behaviour that is destabilizing and risky."

The Trump administration has repeatedly criticized China's assertive actions in the South China Sea

to the disadvantage of smaller claimant countries like the Philippines, Washington's oldest treaty ally in Asia.

The territorial disputes, which also involve Taiwan and ASEAN members Vietnam, Malaysia and Brunei, are high on the agenda of the talks.

ASEAN foreign ministers discussed the disputes on Tuesday, welcoming progress in yearslong negotiations between China and their regional bloc on a proposed non-aggression pact that aims to prevent a major conflict in the disputed waters that could draw in the United States.

A new altercation on Monday between Chinese and Filipino forces in a disputed shoal renewed concerns and prompted Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. to summon the Chinese ambassador in Manila.

"We reaffirmed the need to enhance mutual trust and confidence, exercise self-restraint in the conduct of activities that would complicate or escalate disputes and affect peace and stability and avoid actions that may further complicate the situation," the regional bloc's ministers said in a draft joint statement.

India student protests keep up pressure on Modi government

Crowds of supporters of India's online "cockroach" movement grew on Wednesday at a New Delhi protest site, while their demands for accountability and reform following examination scandals echoed in rallies across the country.

The protests, led by the social media-driven Cockroach Janta Party (CJP) movement, have emerged as one of the biggest challenges to Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government since his re-election in 2024.

The campaign also got a boost on Wednesday inside parliament from opposition lawmakers including Rahul Gandhi of the Congress party who demanded the government apologise for a police crackdown on a major rally on Monday.

Protesters demanding the resignation of Education Minister

Dharmendra Pradhan have refused to leave the Jantar Mantar site in the heart of the Indian capital, with crowds swelling to several thousand people on Wednesday, according to AFP correspondents.

"The government is ruining our future," said Pooja Kushi, a 19-year-old student who came from the northern state of Haryana with her brother and two friends.

The movement has spread beyond the capital, with smaller demonstrations springing up across the country on Wednesday including in major cities like Mumbai and Bengaluru.

In eastern Patna city, police used tear gas and water cannons at a rally demanding Pradhan's resignation, according to the Press Trust of India news agency.

The protesters, most of them young students, got a major boost on Tuesday after opposition parties threw their weight behind the movement, staging

a sit-in outside the prime minister's residence. Gandhi, 56, who was briefly detained on Tuesday, appeared in parliament on Wednesday dressed in black, demanding accountability from the government.

He later told reporters students had his full support, "and we are going to ensure that you are protected and your future is protected".

'Keep going'

The CJP movement, which has millions of followers on social media, emerged in May initially as a satirical response to Chief Justice Surya Kant reportedly likening young people to "cockroaches" and "parasites" during a court hearing.

The movement has broadened its agenda to include concerns over unemployment, opportunities for young people and what it describes as Modi's increasingly authoritarian style of governance.

On Monday, police fired tear gas and baton-charged tens of thousands of demonstrators as they tried to march to parliament on the opening day of the monsoon session, in the capital's largest street rally in five years.

As tensions escalated, protesters responded by hurling stones.

Rights groups have accused police of using excessive force, with Amnesty International questioning the "legality, necessity, and proportionality" of their actions.

At the Jantar Mantar site, where a group of activists has been camping for nearly a month, one protester on Wednesday said it was the first time the country's youth had an opportunity to raise their voice.

"I am scared because on Monday I saw the police beating people and using force, but we have no choice but to keep our movement going," Kavya, a 20-year-old student who gave only his first name, told AFP.

What to know about Iran's Pickaxe Mountain, home to an underground nuclear site threatened by Trump

US President Donald Trump has repeatedly issued threats to bomb an under-construction Iranian nuclear site buried deep under a mountain as the two nations exchange blows over the Strait of Hormuz.

The site, known as Kuh-e Kolang Gaz La, or "Pickaxe Mountain," lies on the south side of Iran's Natanz nuclear enrichment site, which was bombed by the United States during Operation Midnight Hammer in 2025's 12-day war between Iran and Israel.

But Pickaxe Mountain has remained untouched as Iran continues to dig at the site. It remains unclear just what has been placed at Pickaxe Mountain, as the United Nations' nuclear watchdog has never gained access to the site. But Trump on Tuesday talking with journalists in the Oval Office acknowledged the possibility Iran may have moved centrifuges there, potentially at a depth that would challenge even the most-powerful bombs in America's arsenal.

"We'll be hitting that area ... probably pretty soon. And there's not a thing they can do about it," Trump said. Here's what to know about Pickaxe Mountain and the status of Iran's nuclear programme.

Pickaxe Mountain site was built after earlier attacks on Iran

The new project at Pickaxe Mountain is being constructed next to Natanz, about 225 kilometres (140 miles) south of Tehran, Iran's capital. Natanz, a mix of above- and underground facilities, has been a point of international concern since its existence became known two decades ago.

Repeated sabotage attacks on Natanz, including one likely carried out by Israel that destroyed a manufacturing site for centrifuges, led Iranian officials to start work on the Pickaxe Mountain site.

Protected by anti-aircraft batteries, fencing and Iran's paramilitary Revolutionary Guard, the facility sprawls across 2.7 square kilometres (1 square mile) in the country's arid Central Plateau. It has multiple entrances visible from satellite images. In 2023, an Associated Press story on Pickaxe Mountain included analysis from experts at the James Martin Centre for Nonproliferation Studies that suggested Iran is likely building a facility at a depth of between 80 metres and 100 metres. Digging has continued at the site in the time since, with some experts suggesting it could be even deeper underground.

Experts say the size of the construction project indicates Iran will likely be able to use the underground facility to enrich uranium as well as to build centrifuges. Centrifuges, tube-shaped devices arranged in large cascades of dozens of machines, rapidly spin ura-

nium gas to enrich it. Additional cascades spinning would allow Iran to quickly enrich uranium under the mountain's protection. Such underground facilities led the US to create the GBU-57 bomb, which can plough through at least 60 metres of earth before detonating, according to the American military. US officials reportedly have discussed using two such bombs in succession to ensure a

site is destroyed. It is not clear that such a one-two punch would damage a facility as deep as the one at Pickaxe Mountain.

Trump threatens to bomb Pickaxe Mountain site

Speaking alongside Lebanese President Joseph Aoun on Tuesday, Trump initially sought to downplay Pickaxe Mountain by bringing up

Germany approves controversial French-Russian nuclear project

BERLIN: German authorities said on Wednesday they were giving the green light to a controversial French-Russian nuclear project which critics fear will enable spying and sabotage by Moscow.

The planned joint venture by a subsidiary of French company Framatome and Russia's state-owned nuclear power agency Rosatom is aimed at producing fuel rods used in Russian-designed reactors.

The project would be based at Framatome's fuel rod assembly facility in the town of Lingen in the state of Lower Saxony.

Framatome's subsidiary ANF (Advanced Nuclear Fuels) applied for permission for the project in March 2022, just weeks after Russia began its full-scale invasion of Ukraine.

The state's environment ministry said in a statement on Wednesday it had "decided to approve" the project.

This was despite the state's environment minister, Christian Meyer, restating his position that "dealings and close co-operation with Putin's nuclear agency are totally wrong".

He said however that his ministry had "no legal possibility to reject or put a time limit to the application" in the absence of sanctions on Rosatom. (AFP)

Tyson Fury says 'best yet to come'

British boxer Tyson Fury insisted on Wednesday that "the best is yet to come" ahead of a charity fight in Thailand, a warm-up to his long-awaited clash with Anthony Joshua.

"I don't feel like the world's seen the best Tyson Fury yet," said the former two-time world heavyweight champion, who turns 38 next month.

Fury was speaking at an event in the Thai resort of Pattaya to promote his charity fight on Friday against Mariusz Wach, a 46-year-old Pole dubbed "The Viking". The fight in the 1,500-seat Max Muay Thai Stadium is widely viewed as a warm-up to the much-anticipated clash with fellow Briton Joshua expected later this year.

But Fury said he did not want to talk about the Joshua fight, instead focusing on his presence in Thailand and saying that it left him feeling "rejuvenated". "I've been over here since December—beautiful place, beautiful people, great training facilities," he said. "I feel at peace with everything, where before I had a lot of pressure on me...the rain wasn't good, I think I thrive better in obviously warmer climates."

Fury marked his return from a 16-month retirement with a dominant points win over Russia's Arslanbek Makhmudov in April. He was scheduled to fight in Dublin on August 1, but said the opportunity arose to fight in Thailand "for a good cause".

Proceeds from Friday's fight will go to a charity supporting underprivileged children in Pattaya.

The venue is smaller than those Fury is used to, and the fight won't be broadcast live on television but will be recorded for his Netflix television series.

Fury said he had "earned the right" to do what he wanted. "Whoever I want to fight, from any sport, I can make that fight happen. Because I'm the Gypsy King, I do what I want," he said. He said his fights were "not about the money".

"I'm boxing because I want to stay match fit and I enjoy doing it."

Born into a family of Irish Traveller heritage in Wythenshawe in the Manchester suburbs, Fury turned pro in 2008. He famously dethroned long-reigning champion Wladimir Klitschko in 2015, and is known for his exceptional speed despite his towering size of 6 feet 9 inches (2.06 metres).

Joshua, a two-time heavyweight champion, will fight Kristian Prenga in Saudi Arabia on Saturday.

It will be his first return to the ring since being involved in a car crash in Nigeria in December that killed two of his close friends.

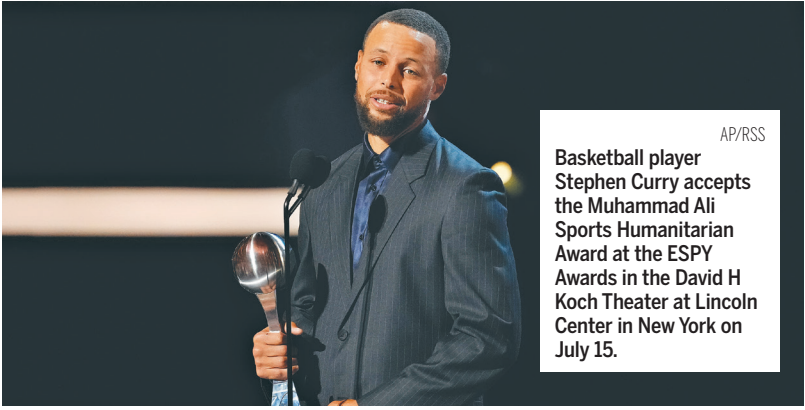
Stephen Curry is headed to the Hall of Fame, making more basketball history with a first-of-its-kind exhibit for an active player.

Stephen Curry: Beyond the Arc is set to open Friday, celebrating the career of a two-time MVP and the NBA's career leader in 3-pointers.

The Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame announced the exhibit Tuesday, saying it was the first time in the museum's nearly 75-year history that an active player would have a dedicated feature experience.

"When I think about my journey, I think about the people who believed in me, the work that happened when nobody was watching and the moments that shaped me on and off the court. To have that story told while I'm still playing is something I don't take lightly," Curry said in a statement. "My hope is that fans walk through this experience and feel the joy, the purpose and the gratitude that basketball has given me, and maybe see a little bit of their own journey in it too."

Developed in partnership with Curry's Thirty Ink business team, the exhibit will feature video footage of

looked going into college and has gone on to become a 12-time All-Star who led Golden State to four NBA champi-

onships. "For him to become the first active player to have an exhibit in the Basketball Hall of Fame is a testament to what he represents to the game, to the Warriors, to the NBA and to his millions of fans around the world," Warriors general manager Mike Dunleavy said. "Obviously, this is only a prelude to his eventual induction in Springfield, but a fitting tribute to an iconic player and an amazing human being who has single-handedly changed the game."

The Hall of Fame expects Curry's to be a limited-time exhibit, likely to last through the summer of 2027 before closing.
